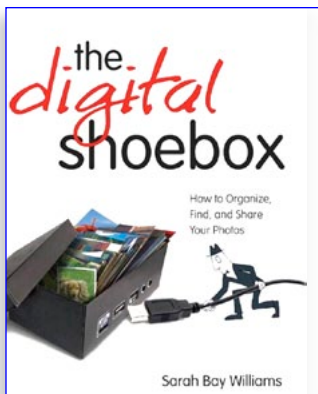


# The Digital Shoebox

This little, easy-to-read book is aimed at intermediate photographers wondering about how to store and retrieve digital images. It starts with a description of a filing system adopted by the author, then it goes on to the subjects of file back-up and sharing.



There is a brief section on printing, both at home and by using on-line services. Finally there are a few pages on copyrighting photographs. The book is well illustrated and the large type will be appreciated by our senior members. The author does a good job of including web sites, listing specific products, and listing software that runs on both Apple and PC computers.

The problem with the book is that it is incomplete, at least to the extent that there is no mention whatever of the “Organizer” part of *Photoshop Elements*. Because

*Photoshop Elements* is the best selling program of its type, the “Organizer” is already on the computers of millions of photographers. There are other places where the author’s inexperience shows, such as in her description of RAW images and her understanding of the use of key words.

The book is well worth the few hours it takes to read it. It would be a good addition to a public library or a good Christmas gift, but as an investment, there are better books on the market
